

## Preparing the abstract for CNS 2009 Symposium

- Please save your abstract in Rich-Text-Format (RTF) so as to be compatible with Microsoft Word 2000.** Please use a standard Microsoft character set such as Times Roman or Arial in 10-12 pt type size. Your abstract should be no more than 2,400 characters (including spaces and punctuation), 200 characters more than the Society for Neuroscience abstracts. Abstracts prepared for that meeting should be fine.
  - **Special characters** such as Greek ( $\alpha$ ,  $\beta$ ) or algebraic ( $\pm$ ) should use the Microsoft Symbol font character set. Otherwise, please spell it out.
  - **Use standard abbreviations.** When using abbreviations for chemical compounds, spell out in full the first mention, followed by the abbreviation in parentheses. Do not abbreviate compounds in the title of the abstract.
  - **The presenting author's name** should be indicated with an asterisk (i.e., W. Smith\*)
  - **Figures and tables are permitted within the abstract.** A small figure (roughly 1.5 x 1.5 inch) takes the place of 350 characters. A large figure (roughly 1.3 x 3 inch) takes the place of 700 characters.
- Contact information:** Include the name, address, phone number(s), and email of the presenting author below the abstract.
- Please indicate one of the following categories at the bottom of the page:**
  - visceral pain / stress
  - gender difference
  - neuroimmunology
  - autonomic nervous system
  - outcomes research
  - mind-brain-body interactions
- Posters accepted for presentation will need to fit on the small size BRI poster boards (4' x 4') in order to accommodate as many posters as possible.** Like last year, this year's poster session will be set up in the atrium outside the Neuroscience Research Building Auditorium.
- A limited number of extra boards will be available for larger posters that have already been printed for a previous meeting. If you will need an additional board, please mention this in your abstract submission.
